Dr. Clark Butler, Professor of Philosophy and Director of the IPFW Institute of Human Rights, and Jennifer Caseldine-Bracht, Associate Faculty member in the Philosophy accompany students to Strasbourg and provide on-site academic and personal support. Both are published human rights scholars.

Cost: \$2850 (undergraduate) or \$2950 (graduate) covering IPFW tuition and Strasbourg Institute tuition, dormitory, faculty support, and medical insurance. IPFW financial aid may be applied to tuition. Food expenses and international airfare are not covered. *Please note fees may change due to residency status.* A \$500 non-refundable deposit is due at the IPFW Division of Continuing Studies (Kettler Hall, Room 139) by March 15, 2009 and the full payment deadline is April 15, 2009.

This system-wide Indiana University Study Abroad program based on IPFW Campus is a Summer II study program comprising six credit hours of academic coursework to take place at the René Cassin International Institute of Human Rights in Strasbourg, France. René Cassin founded this Institute in Strasbourg with the award money received when he won the Nobel Prize for Peace for having drafted the 1948 United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The program addresses ethics students, pre-law students, and students in all other fields in which human rights law is applicable.

The Institute offers a unique international experience. Lecturers represent prestigious universities and international organizations from all over the world. Over 350 students gather from over 50 countries each year to participate by attending lectures and discussion sessions at the International Institute for Human Rights. In all, this will entail over 80 hours of lecture and a comprehensive exam.

Successful students will receive a certificate from the Strasbourg Institute, a valuable credential on top of Purdue University or Indiana University letter grades.

Students must register at IPFW for two 3-hour sections. They may choose between two options: (1) POL 371 International Human Rights Law I and POL 371 International Human Rights Law II or (2) PHIL 580 Philosophical Foundations of Human Rights I and POLS 371 International Human Rights Law I. These are dual level courses which may be taken either at the graduate or advanced undergraduate level. The coursework may be taken either for letter grades, on a Pass-Fail basis, or by Audit.
